Mandatory Retirement John Owen and Sergey Fedoroff

The matter of mandatory retirement was first raised by retirees Keith Johnstone and John Owen in the February 2004 issue of USRA News. At that time, they urged the USRA to initiate discussions with interested parties to bring the University of Saskatchewan's retirement policy in line with those of other Canadian universities. Their published recommendation received only lukewarm reception in the News, and no USRA action was implemented.

It is now timely to raise the matter again and ask the USRA to reconsider its stance. The trend across Canada is for universities to adopt policies which would allow retention of experienced faculty beyond normal retiring age (65 at most universities). Last year's policy decision by the University of Toronto was noteworthy. The U of T faculty now have four retirement options - early retirement, phased-in retirement, regular retirement at age 65 and late retirement. These provisions have been well documented by Professor John


Mandatory Retirement continues from page one

Courtney in *On Campus News* (April 25, 2005). They could serve as a model for the University of Saskatchewan.

Since the removal of financial incentives, the number of U of S faculty choosing early retirement has dropped. Even so, in 2005, half of retiring faculty elected to take early retirement. Indeed, early retirement appears to be the trend in the Canadian workforce. According to Statistics Canada, only six percent of Canadians work beyond the age of 65, and the average age of retirement is 62. Our University should not be fearful about ageing professors clinging to their jobs!

We believe that the USRA can no longer show disinterest in what is increasingly perceived as a factor in sustaining the Province's economy. Demographic trends portend a diminishing work force and provide a challenge to its universities to show leadership by abolishing mandatory retirement.

As a first step, could not the USRA accept the challenge and support a proposal to establish a joint faculty and administration committee to discuss the matter? Such a committee was recently formed at the University of Regina. The "North" should not lag behind the "South"!

Retirees' Pension Plan

A number of pensioners have asked why the Pension Plan has been unable to provide a cost-of-living increase for several years. The simple answer is that the actuary must certify that the Plan has a sufficient surplus to pay such an increase. For several years the actuarial analysis of the Plan has not permitted him to do so.

This, of course, raises the question of why the Plan has not had sufficient earnings in recent years to cover a cost-of -living increase. The Retirees' Plan is unusual in that it is a closed plan with a declining membership and will eventually terminate. No new members or new money are coming in. For this reason the Plan has to be very conservative in its investments.

At the inception of the Plan, its investment advisor, J. P. Marshall, presented a number of scenarios on various asset mixes and their earnings and volatility over the previous thirty years. The committee selected an asset mix that had a reasonable level of earnings and good stability. In retrospect, who would have predicted the scenario that has unfolded with, for example, Canadian equity markets much stronger than U. S. markets, particularly in Canadian dollar terms.

Unfortunately, at a time when pay outs from the Plan were large, financial markets throughout the world went through a substantial recession. As a result, more than expected of the Plan's capital had to be used to pay pensions. Even in the stronger markets of the last three years, it has been difficult to rebuild the Plan's principal. The Plan's investment managers are relatively conservative and did well during the recession. For example, the following are their results for canadian equities:

Over the four years, the fund has outperformed its benchmark slightly - not a bad performance.
