Important Changes to Retirees' Duke E-Mail over Next 12 Months

Information Technology Services (ITS) will be decommissioning six years old Skyway and Duke, first implemented over 15 years ago. The hardware is nearing its end of life and no longer will be manufactured after October 2007.

Other servers already offer better performance and higher capacity. Specifically, E-mail is provided on *mail.usask.ca* for all faculty, staff, and students. This service will include retirees.

In answer to a query from USRA News, Alfred Hovdestad, System Administrator wrote: "We are going to continue to offer retirees the privilege of e-mail, we are just moving them from duke.usask.ca to mail.usask.ca. We have a faster server and larger disk quotas on mail.usask.ca.

Retirees will be responsible for updating their desktop email client with the new settings (we will send a list of updates to all retirees and offer any assistance that we can)."

Once the migration of web pages is complete, ITS will focus on e-mail. Please contact: alfred.hovdestad@usask.ca. if you would like to arrange an early migration of your e-mail.

MEMBERS WILL BE HEARING FROM THE COMMITTEE FOR RETIREES PENSION PLAN

Peter Lane wrote on May 7, 2006, "Perhaps there are members of the Association who are disappointed with the recent pension results. If so, it might be helpful if we could meet with the pension board to discuss things. After all, it is our money. Anyone interested?"

As if anticipating Peter's letter and others, at the most recent Executive meeting, Doug Knott reported that The Committee for Retirees' Pension Plan recently reviewed its 2005 actuarial report and will mail out a newsletter to the 297 members which will provide an analysis of the report.

Not too long after the distribution of the newsletter, the committee will invite pension members to a Saskatoon meeting to discuss the newsletter's information.

The USRA News will cover, as fully as possible, the meeting's discussion, reporting concerns, implications and future pension expectations. The USRA Executive was told that fund members will not receive a cost of living increase this year, nor might they expect one in the foreseeable future.

S. Parvez Wakil, deceased April 24, 2006. Dr. Wakil retired in 2003 from the Department of Sociology. He was hired in 1964. His spouse, Farkhanda Akhtar, survives him.

Thanks to Doris Hasell and guide, Leah Taylor, about 20 of us had a superb morning walking Ag's labyrinthine halls, peeking into some open offices which had on their walls one or two examples of the extensive U of S collection, mainly produced by local or visiting artists, dating back to the 1870s, or earlier. Many of the current art objects on the sixth floor were given or loaned to the U of S by the Kloppenberg family.

A bit of lagniappe Doris arranged was to show us a panoramic views of the city and campus from the top of the Ag Building, where we did the moving. It is well worth a visit just to fill your digital camera with snaps and make them into works of art, or recognition games.

I returned to find teaching pictures, charts and posters created by Order of Canada local artist, Ernst Lindner. Dean Murray hired him to help him put food on the table, pay the rent and have the wherewithal to develop as the famed Canadian artist he eventually became.

Following the tour we gathered for lunch at Boffins, and remained, as it happened on a previous visit, for a few hours.
