

Of Interest To Retirees

Retiree Gwenna Moss, in collaboration with three other former University Extension staff – Henrietta Mackay Goplen, Thelma Howard, and Glenora Pearce Slimmon, has recently edited a new book recalling the history of Home Economics Extension activities over more than fifty years in Saskatchewan. Two dozen Extension home economists and a few program participants contributed their personal memories, stories and photographs.

The book is titled: Stories from the Road: **Memories of Home Economics Extension at the University of** Saskatchewan, 1913-1980. The authors note that "these stories, told by Extension staff and participants, show the links between the university and women and girls on farms, in small towns and on reserves, created through such programs as Homemakers' Clubs, Farm Girls' Camps, Homecraft Clubs, short courses, field days, 4-H camps, and youth training. Profiles of the directors and many staff members of the Department of Women's Work /Women's Service highlight these amazing women and their work. The book celebrates the spirit of the people of rural Saskatchewan who shared their energy and gifts as leaders."

Changing Membership Dues

At the March meeting of the USRA Executive Committee, the Ad hoc Committee to Consider an Increase in USRA Dues made its report. The core recommendations are that the annual membership dues be increased from \$15 to \$20 and that life memberships in each category be increased by \$20.

Membership dues in the USRA have remained unchanged for more than a decade. In the past two years, the USRA has experienced small deficits in its operating budget—making an increase in dues a prudent step. Higher dues are also needed, because the USRA has increased its program and has negotiated a Retiree Engagement Strategy to enable Retirees to provide greater service to the University of Saskatchewan.

An increase in USRA dues will not occur unless it is approved at the Annual General Meeting in September. Any retiree considering a yearly or life membership in the USRA will be able to benefit from the current lower dues structure. Until September, the annual membership fee is \$15. Life memberships are dependent on age, according to the following schedule:

<60 years	\$ 180
60 - 64	\$ 160
65 - 69	\$ 140
70 - 74	\$ 110
75 - 79	\$ 80
+ 08	\$ 50

Prime of Life Achievement Award

The University of Saskatchewan Retirees Association (USRA) requests your assistance in identifying prospective recipients of the Prime of Life Achievement Award (PLAA) which honours and shows appreciation of recognition given to persons who have retired from work at the University. If you know an individual who fits the Award description below, please submit a nomination.

History

The University and its respective Colleges often recognize and reward employees for outstanding accomplishments. However, if after retirement a former University employee receives special awards or recognition, the University does not have a mechanism by which to offer congratulations. In 1997, the USRA inaugurated such a mechanism.

The first Prime of Life Awards were given in 1997 to a backlog of 60 worthy recipients. Since that time, a further 31 Awards have been presented. Please see the insert for a list of past Award recipients.

Award Description

The PLAA honours and expresses appreciation of persons who have retired from work at the University and who, *after their retirement*, have been recognized for outstanding scholarly, artistic or service contributions. Such contributions would have been recognized by international, national, provincial or local bodies (e.g., Order of Canada, Saskatchewan Order of Merit, honorary lifetime recognitions from

national or provincial professional societies or associations, honorary degrees, national artistic commissions, Saskatoon Citizen of the Year).

The Awards are presented at the banquet following the USRA AGM in the Fall.

Nomination Forms

The Prime of Life Achievement Awards
Committee invites nominations from the
University Community; however, anyone
may nominate a worthy candidate. A
nomination form is included with this
newsletter. Should you require additional
nomination forms, please send us an email
at ss.usra@usask.ca or download a form
from the USRA website www.usra.usask.ca
Please note that two signatures are
required for the nomination and a complete
post-retirement CV may be requested.

Nominations may be submitted at any time, but must be received by April 30 to be considered for an Award in that year.
