Bryan Harvey Elected CURAC Vice President

At the 2018 Annual General Meeting of the College and University Retiree Associations of Canada (CURAC) at Dalhousie University May 24, Past USRA President Bryan Harvey was elected Vice President for the first year of a two-year term on the Board of Directors. All USRA members are members of CURAC, an umbrella organization of post-secondary Canadian retiree associations. Bryan led the organization of CURAC's annual conference when it was hosted by USRA at the University of Saskatchewan in May 2016. The CURAC Nominating Committee described Bryan as follows:

"Bryan Harvey ... an internationally recognized scholar and administrator ... as a faculty member at the Universities of Guelph and Saskatchewan ... has taught courses at all levels and supervised many graduate students. He created an accreditation mechanism for Programs in Agrology used for Canadian and foreign universities. He was Head of the Crop Science and Plant Ecology and Horticulture

departments, Director of the Crop Development Centre, Co-ordinator of Agricultural Research and Vice President Research at the University of Saskatchewan. He has served on numerous executives and committees and over 30 Boards (many as chair) in Canada and Internationally. He served on the executive of the USRA and held the following positions, President, chair Education and Social Committee, Awards Committee, Engagement Committee and local organizing committee for the CURAC meeting 2016. His research helped to establish Canada as a major exporter of malt and malting barley bringing billions of dollars into the economy. His accomplishments have been recognized by numerous awards, including, Officer Order of Canada, Saskatchewan Order of Merit, Fellow Agricultural Institute of Canada, American Society of Agronomy and Crop Science Society of America, Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame and Honorary Life Memberships in the CSGA, SSGA and ASGA."

USRA Nominees Awarded Honorary Degrees

Each spring the USRA's Honorary Degrees Committee asks the membership to suggest candidates worthy of receiving one of the University of Saskatchewan's degrees honoris causa: Doctor of Science (D.Sc.), Doctor of Letters (D.Litt.), or Doctor of Laws (LL.D., which since the mid-1960s has been preferred to Doctor of Civil Law, D.C.L). In 2017-18, the USRA Executive was gratified that two of its candidates nominated in 2016 were awarded the D.Sc., honoris causa, and D.Litt., honoris causa, respectively: at the Fall Convocation, Dr. Ali **Raiput**, Professor Emeritus and former Head of Neurology in the College of Medicine, and at the Spring Convocation, **Dr. David Carpenter**, Professor Emeritus of English in the College of Arts and Science.

A degree honoris causa is the highest honour bestowed by the University. Customarily one honorary doctorate is presented at each Convocation ceremony. Nominations must be kept confidential even from the candidate until the President of the University announces the recipient not long before the honorary doctorate is conferred. Consideration of nominees, who are vetted by the University's Honorary Degrees Committee for recommendation to the Senate, usually takes several years. This Committee will not meet again until 2019, but it is not too early to begin assembling a nomination. The process requires completion of a form signed by three nominators, a short statement on the candidate, supporting letters of recommendation by the nominators and others, and (if possible) the candidate's curriculum vitae. Only in extremely rare circumstances are Honorary Degrees awarded posthumously or in absentia.

The criteria and process differ from those for the degrees of Earned Doctor of Letters (D.Litt.) and Earned Doctor of Science (D.Sc.) approved by the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. Only members of Convocation or current and emeritus faculty members of the University may be either nominated by others or apply for the Earned Doctorates.

Among the rules the University uses to avoid conflict of interest in awarding Honorary Doctorates is the exclusion of "current or recent faculty and staff" from consideration; i.e., the candidate must not have been employed by the University for at least five years. The USRA-nominated Professors Emeriti who received Honorary Doctorates in 2017-18 had retired before 2012-13. But Dr. Rajput, MSc, FRCPC, OC, SOM, MBBS, a renowned expert on Parkinson's Disease and other movement disorders, has remained active in clinical practice and research long past his official "retirement" date from faculty. (See his own description of his research career in the March 2018 USRA Newsletter, pp. 9-10.) Dr. Carpenter, after teaching English on the faculty from 1975 to 1998, took early retirement to become a full-time creative writer. Capping his production of novels, short stories, essays, and poems, and his editing and mentoring of other writers, he has recently edited the pioneering, threevolume Literary History of Saskatchewan and has been celebrated for guiding into

print over many years *The Education of Augie Merasty*, the memoir of a Cree trapper's residential school experiences. Dr. Carpenter's Convocation address encouraged graduands to reach out to and learn from those whose experiences of life have been diverse from their own.

The USRA Honorary Degrees Committee welcomes suggestions and assistance in nominating candidates as a service to the University. Nominators may be *members* of the University community or the public, but USRA endorses only nominations signed by at least one USRA member and forwarded by its Executive following Committee approval. The deadline for USRA-supported nominations will be announced in early 2019.

Provost Touts "Plan 2025" to Sceptical Audience

At the USRA's April 18 luncheon, held at Smiley's Buffet on Circle Drive, Provost and Vice-President Academic Tony Vannelli described the University of Saskatchewan's new strategic framework, the eight-year "Plan 2025" to become "the university the world needs," to a sceptical audience. The plan is an outcome of the University's consultation, with the USRA Executive Committee among others, on its new "Mission, Vision, and Values" statement, revised and approved in 2016. Much of this consultation was focused on assembling and refining lists of key words to define how the University conceives itself and its roles. Work on the strategic plan incorporating these words began early in 2017, before Dr. Vannelli took office last August. He credits President Peter Stoicheff with spearheading its development.

Dr. Vannelli (B.Sc. Hons., M.Sc. Mathematics, Concordia, Ph.D. Electrical Engineering, Waterloo) introduced himself as a Montreal native and as an engineering professor with extensive administrative experience in Ontario universities. At Waterloo he served as Chair of Electrical and Computer Engineering and as Associate Dean of Research and External Partnerships, and at Guelph as Dean of Physical and Engineering Science. In 2016 for his research into the design of circuits for computers, he was appointed Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Engineering (FCAE).

He sees his new role as Provost as responsibility for resources, including lives. He recalled that his father, a World War II officer, advised him to "remember who's on the ground." The U of S, with its remarkable range of programs and facilities, seems to him "very modest" about its unique opportunity to serve a needy world, but he admires its attitude that "people matter" and the "get-it-done mentality" that Saskatchewan has shown in the aftermath of the Humboldt tragedy.

Dr. Vannelli explained the University's visual representation of Plan 2025 as a "Weave" of key goals. They are the black, gray, and green threads of a plaid, or as the University website describes it, "a tightly woven belt of fabric ... tying together our University's legacy, spirit, and future into a singular description of who we are and aspire to become": see The University Plan (https://www.usask.ca/plan).

The Provost said that the horizontal lines of the "Weave" present "what we do." The black horizontal lines define the geography of the strategy as Regional, Provincial, National, and International. The grey lines present our Mission: of Discovery,

Indigenization, Teaching and Learning, and Engagement. The green lines present our Vision: of Courageous Curiosity impacting world problems through discovery, Indigenization, interdisciplinarity, and problem solving; of Boundless Collaboration among disciplines and colleges and in partnership with governments and industries; and of Inspired Communities achieving reconciliation and meaningful change by healthy dialogue between rural and urban, Indigenous peoples and newcomers. The black vertical lines holding these threads together are the University's Values or principles: Sustainability, Diversity, Connectivity, and Creativity. The website relates them also to values expressed by words in the Cree and Michif languages.

Dr. Vannelli mentioned changes under consideration, such as a new bachelor's degree in pre-med or health sciences and collaboration between engineering and medicine to develop technology for treating tumours. He invites the engagement of alumni and retirees in the process of developing by June 2019 a campaign to support key areas in the University. He asserts his respect for retirees as those who "built this place" and invites dialogue about the directions the University takes.

Nevertheless, in the discussion period Dr. Vannelli found himself fielding hard questions that addressed the past as well as the future of the University. Some retired faculty questioned Plan 2025's goal of solving world problems and objected to past cuts to units, such as the Extension Division, oriented to serving Saskatchewan people. Professor Emeritus of History Michael Hayden, introducing himself as "author of the only peer-reviewed history of the University", defined its founding as

"the People's University" as meaning engagement with the people of the Province. One of the emeriti in the audience disagreed with Dr. Hayden, observing that the world-class synchrotron was strongly supported by Saskatchewan people, but others expressed concern about administrative neglect of the liberal arts as core of the University, the creation of Global Institutes that "have no impact on the Province," recent extreme budget cuts to colleges, especially Agriculture and Biotechnology (11%), and failure to explain "Indigenization" to the people, who "don't understand it."

In response, Dr. Vannelli replied respectfully to several of the objections. He acknowledged that Engineering was also cut 10% and the average cutback to colleges across campus was 5 ½%. Administrative decisions were based on a Control Management Model weighing direct and indirect costs against measures of success. He explained "Indigenization" as, first, understanding how Indigenous peoples look at issues and bringing their thinking into our University, for instance, in academic programs, and second, aligning equity, fairness, law, and justice as our communities deal with each other. "Reconciliation is always much harder than walking away." To Dr. Don Hamilton's challenge to the Provost to "be a champion for the core liberal arts," Dr. Vannelli agreed that they are "a core driver" with "measurable impact" in "what they do" and assured the audience that in the pre-budget decisions underway he "is working to protect that core, which is critical to the University's success."


Architect's Rendering of Proposed Site
